









Asthma Policy

As a Church School, the distinctive Christian values of respect, compassion, trust, justice, friendship and community are promoted through the experiences we offer to all our pupils, to give pupils the knowledge, skills and understanding that they require to lead confident, healthy and independent lives. We promote the teaching and understanding of fundamental British values in order to prepare pupils for life in modern Britain. We positively teach the values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect for and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs and for those without faith. Teaching the fundamental British values helps the children to become informed, active and responsible citizens.

This policy outlines the purpose, nature and management of **Asthma** in our school. It reflects the consensus of opinion of all members of staff. It is based on current practice and has the full agreement of the governing body. The implementation of this policy is the responsibility of the Head teacher, teaching staff and support staff. It is our collective responsibility to raise awareness and that all policies are known, understood and used in an appropriate way.

Background

This Policy has been written with advice from the Department for Education & Skills, Asthma UK, the local education authority, local healthcare professionals, the school health service, and the Governing Body. This School recognises that asthma is a widespread, serious but controllable condition affecting many pupils at the school. The school positively welcomes all pupils with asthma. This school encourages pupils with asthma to achieve their potential in all aspects of school life by having a clear policy that is understood by school staff, their employers (the local education authority) and pupils. Supply teachers and new staff are also made aware of the policy. All staff who come into contact with pupils with asthma are provided with training on asthma within the 3 yearly First Aid Training.

Asthma medicines

- Immediate access to reliever medicines is essential. The reliever inhalers are kept in the classroom, in the first aid basket/cupboard. This cupboard is clearly labelled in each classroom.
- All asthma medications are taken into the hall and outside with the child at lunchtime. They are taken outside during a fire drill and if the class go on a local area visit or an educational visit.
- Parents/carers are asked to ensure that the school is provided with a labelled spare reliever inhaler. All inhalers must be labelled with the child's name by the parent/carer. It is the actual cylinder of an inhaler that needs to have a printed out label of the child's name, not simply the box.
- School staff are not required to administer asthma medicines to pupils (except in an emergency), however
 many of the staff at this school are happy to assist. School staff who agree to administer medicines are insured
 by the local education authority when acting in agreement with this policy. All school staff will let pupils take
 their own medicines when they need to.

Record keeping

• At the beginning of each school year or when a child joins the school, parents/carers are asked if their child has any medical conditions including asthma on their enrolment form.

- All parents/carers of children with asthma are consequently sent an Asthma UK *School Asthma Card* to give to their child's doctor or asthma nurse to complete. Parents/carers are asked to return them to the school. From this information the school keeps its asthma register, which is available to all school staff.
- School Asthma Cards are then sent to parents/carers of children with asthma on an annual basis to update. Parents/carers are also asked to update or exchange the card for a new one if their child's medicines, or how much they take, changes during the year.

Exercise and activity - PE and games

Taking part in sports, games and activities is an essential part of school life for all pupils. Class teachers know
which children in their class have asthma and pupils with asthma are encouraged to participate fully in all PE
lessons. Teachers will remind pupils whose asthma is triggered by exercise to take their reliever inhaler before
the lesson, and to thoroughly warm up and down before and after the lesson. If a pupil needs to use their
inhaler during a lesson they will be encouraged to do so.

Out-of-hours sport

- There has been a large emphasis in recent years on increasing the number of children and young people involved in exercise and sport in and outside of school. The health benefits of exercise are well documented and this is also true for children and young people with asthma. It is therefore important that the school involve pupils with asthma as much as possible in after school clubs.
- Classroom teachers are aware of the potential triggers for pupils with asthma when exercising and what to do in the event of an asthma attack.

School environment

• The school does all that it can to ensure the school environment is favourable to pupils with asthma. The school does not keep furry or feathery animals indoors and has a definitive no-smoking policy. As far as possible the school does not use chemicals that are potential triggers for pupils with asthma.

When a pupil is falling behind in lessons

- If a pupil is missing a lot of time at school or is always tired because their asthma is disturbing their sleep at night, the class teacher will initially talk to the parents/carers to work out how to prevent their child from falling behind. If appropriate, the teacher will then talk to the school nurse and special education needs coordinator about the pupil's needs.
- The school recognises that it is possible for pupils with asthma to have special education needs due to their asthma.

Asthma attacks

• All staff who come into contact with pupils with asthma know what to do in the event of an asthma attack. In the event of an asthma attack the school follows the procedure outlined by Asthma UK in its *Guidance on the Use of Emergency Salbutamol Inhalers in School*. This document, outlining procedures, is in the staffroom, the first aid area and in every classroom.
