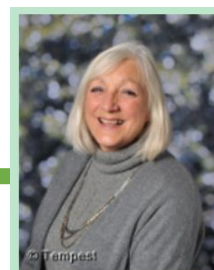
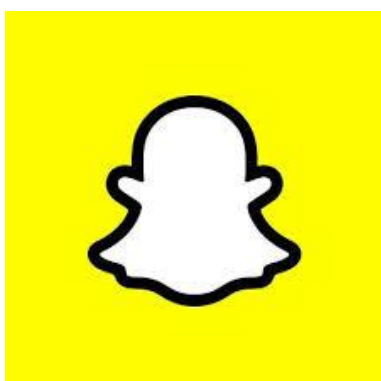

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Snapchat is a photo sharing app for mobile phones and tablets. The app allows users to share images, videos and chat with friends through voice call or text messages. Users can share images and videos directly to specific friends, or through a 'story' shared with their entire friend list, which disappears the previous 24 hours. In a study, Snapchat was ranked the 4th most negative app in terms of having an impact on young people's health and wellbeing, with children feeling that they can use the app Snapchat to "make you look pretty."

EXPOSING YOUR CHILD'S EXACT LOCATION

The 'Snap Map' lets you share your EXACT location in real-time through a map on the app. The user's location updates when the app has been opened on the device. There is a warning on the Snapchat website about uploading images and videos to 'Your Story' stating that "your post cannot be 'seen' by anyone who isn't on the Map, so consider which location you're choosing". When uploading to 'Your Story', users upload images or videos could appear in 'Snapchat Moments' and be seen by all Snapchat users.

SEXING

While Snapchat's growth is that all photos, videos and text disappear eventually, users still have the opportunity to screenshot or record anything which has been sent to them. Users may sometimes forget that screenshotting is possible and send a compromising image or message to somebody who they think they trust. Due to 'Snapchat Shoppers', users can now send a one-second photo or video. Snapchat has become the chosen platform for children and young people to send sexually explicit images or videos. There is a 'photo' water mark, a watermark or recording using another device or software. This can lead to further dangers, such as blackmail and cyberbullying.

EXTRAS TO MAKE YOU STAY

Aside from taking photos and videos, Snapchat has other elements to keep users coming back for more. 'Snap Games' is a feature within the app where users can play mini-games with others on their friends list. The game features a weekly contest by logging in the in-game feature during a consecutive, five-day streak on the app is 'Snap Streaks', which allows users to watch content including Snapchat, celebrities and other accounts, including a mixture of comedy shows, movies, music and more. These features are designed to encourage users to stay on the app, which may be quite addictive.

ADDICTIVE SNAPSTREAKS

'Snap Streaks' are personal image snaps have been sent back and forth consecutively between friends. The longer that snaps are sent between users, the longer the streak has been. Furthermore, Snapchat rewards users who have achieved high 'Snap Streaks'. As getting streaks, getting incentives for users can keep this cycle a habit. Some users may make their streaks as long as possible, which can put an incredible amount of pressure on both themselves and their friendships.

DAMAGE TO CONFIDENCE

Snapchat's collection of filters and lenses are seen as a great way to enhance your 'selfie game'. Although the filters are often designed to promote self-love and happiness, using the 'Beauty' filter on photos can increase insecurity and create feelings of inadequacy. Children may strive for perfection and appreciation by sending their edited photos to their friend list, putting themselves behind other users on the app might increase their confidence or self-worth.

REPORTING A STORY, LENS, FILTER, SNAP OR MESSAGE

If your child comes across inappropriate content on Snapchat, you can report it to the app. To report a story, lens, filter, snap or message, tap the three dots in the top right corner of the content. Then, tap 'Report'. You will be asked to select the reason for the report. You can select 'Inappropriate', 'Sexual', 'Harassment', 'Bullying', 'Stalking', 'Self-harm', 'Suicidal thoughts', 'Drugs', 'Alcohol', 'Tobacco', 'Gambling', 'Illegal activities', 'Fraud', 'Scams', 'Identity theft', 'Catfishing', 'Impersonation', 'Harassment', 'Bullying', 'Stalking', 'Self-harm', 'Suicidal thoughts', 'Drugs', 'Alcohol', 'Tobacco', 'Gambling', 'Illegal activities', 'Fraud', 'Scams', 'Identity theft', 'Catfishing', 'Impersonation'.

USE 'GHOST MODE'

We highly recommend enabling 'Ghost Mode' on the app so that your child's location is not visible to their friends. To enable 'Ghost Mode', tap the three dots in the top right corner of the app. Then, tap 'Ghost Mode'. You will be asked to confirm that you want to enable 'Ghost Mode'. Tap 'Yes'.

HOW TO DELETE A MESSAGE

To delete a message, tap the three dots in the top right corner of the message. Then, tap 'Delete'. You will be asked to confirm that you want to delete the message. Tap 'Yes'.

TURN OFF 'QUICK ADD'

To turn off 'Quick Add', tap the three dots in the top right corner of the app. Then, tap 'Quick Add'. You will be asked to confirm that you want to turn off 'Quick Add'. Tap 'Yes'.

RESTRICT STORY VIEWS

Your child can add others and share their 'Story' with them. To restrict who can view their 'Story', tap the three dots in the top right corner of the app. Then, tap 'Who can view my story?'. You will be asked to select who can view your child's story. You can select 'Only me', 'My friends', 'My friends and select others', 'Public'.

What is Whatsapp

WhatsApp is a messaging app owned by Meta that allows users (13+) to send text, voice, and video messages, make calls, and share media, documents, and locations, all using an internet connection

Privacy Settings

Whatsapp has the following privacy settings -

Last seen online
Profile photo
About
Status
Read receipts
Silence unknown callers

You can set these features to Everyone, My contacts, My contacts except..., and Nobody

Location Sharing

WhatsApp gives you the ability to share your device's location with other users

This can be turned off in settings

Reporting and Blocking

You can report problematic content to WhatsApp. You can also block a user to stop all contact

Sharing Personal Information

Ensure you remind your children that they shouldn't share private information including -

- names, phone numbers, links to other social media accounts or their school
- locations
- other people's personal information
- links to join private group chats
- photos of themselves including indecent images

Group chats

Whatsapp has the ability for users to be added or create group chats, if you're child is added into a group chat with people they don't know that will give that person the ability to chat with them.

You can't always control if you're added to a group chat; but remind children that they can always leave whenever they want to or block unwanted contact

You can mute the group chat without leaving the group, this stops notifications but still allows you to check in when you want.

Tips for Encouraging Open Discussions about DIGITAL LIVES

The online world is an entirely familiar and commonplace part of life for today's children and young people, far more so than for previous generations. There are many positives to children being able to access online materials, so it's important not to demonise the Internet, games and apps, and limit the benefit of their positive aspects. At the same time, we do have a responsibility to educate children about the hazards they may encounter online (just as we would about real-world dangers) so it's essential that we don't shy away from talking to them about the complex – and often sensitive – subject of what they do and what they see when they're online.

Here are some suggestions for kicking off conversations with your child about their digital life ...

MAKE YOUR INTEREST CLEAR

Showing enthusiasm when you broach the subject signals to your child that you're keen to learn about the positives of their online world. Most children enjoy educating adults and will happily chat about what they use the Internet for, or what games and apps they're into and how these work. Asking to see their favourite games and apps in action could help you spot any aspects that may need your attention – such as chat functions which might require a settings adjustment to limit contact with strangers. Keep listening even if your child pauses for a long time; they could be considering how to phrase something specific, or they may be gauging your reaction.

BE OPEN AND HONEST, APPROPRIATE TO THEIR AGE

At various stages, children and young people become curious about puberty and how their body changes; about relationships; about how babies are made; and about sexual health. If your child knows that they can discuss these sensitive subjects with you, they tend to be less likely to go looking online for answers – which can often provide them with misleading information and, in some cases, lead to them consuming harmful content. Don't worry if you don't immediately know the answers to their questions – just find out for yourself and go back to them once you have the facts.

REMAND YOUR CHILD THEY CAN ALWAYS TALK TO YOU

In my role I work with many children and young people who admit being reluctant to tell a trusted adult about harmful content they've viewed online. In case it leads to having their devices confiscated. Emphasise to your child that you're always there to listen and help; reassure them that if they do view harmful content, then they are not to blame – but talking about it openly will help. Children shouldn't be expected to be resilient against abuse or feel that it's their job to prevent it.

KEEP TALKING!

The most valuable advice we can give is to keep talking with your child about their digital lives. You could try using everyday situations to ask questions about their online experiences.

DISCUSS THAT NOT EVERYTHING WE SEE ONLINE IS REAL

Here, you could give examples from your own digital life of the online world versus reality – for example, those Instagram posts which show the perfect house: spotlessly clean, never messy and immaculately decorated. Explain to your child that there are many other aspects of the online world which are also deliberately presented in an unrealistic way for effect – such as someone's relationship, their body, having perfect skin and so on.

TRY TO REMAIN CALM

As much as possible, try to stay calm even if your child tells you about an online experience that makes you feel angry or fearful. Our immediate emotions frequently influence the way we talk, so it's possible that your initial reaction as a parent or carer could deter a child from speaking openly about what they've seen. Give yourself time to consider the right approach, and perhaps speak with your family members or school staff while you are considering your next steps.

CREATE A 'FAMILY AGREEMENT'

Involving your whole household in coming up with a family agreement about device use can be immensely beneficial. You could discuss when (and for how long) it's OK to use phones, tablets, consoles and so on at home; what parental controls are for and why they're important; and why it's good to talk to each other about things we've seen or experienced online (both good and bad). Explaining your reasoning will help children to understand that, as trusted adults, we want to make sure they are well informed and kept safe. Allowing children to have their say when coming up with your family agreement also makes them far more likely to stick to it in the long term.
